
Please do not message on Dojo.



Catholic Life

Ash Wednesday - Fr Andrew, with the support of Year 6, led KS2 in a liturgy for the distribution of ashes. We reflected on things we want to say sorry for, and receive ash on the crown of our heads as a demonstration that we want to try and do better. During Lent, we focus on fasting (giving things up), almsgiving (doing something extra) and forgiveness (saying sorry for what we have done wrong and forgiving people who have hurt us).





The Mini Vinnies led KS2 in a liturgical prayer on Reconciliation and the parable of the unforgiving servant. They thought about forgiveness and reflected on anything they needed to say sorry for with an examination of conscience. After this, each class was invited to spend some time in the Chapel in Adoration. This is a time when Catholics believe the real presences of Jesus is with us in the Blessed Sacrament (bread which has been transformed by a priest, through prayer, into the body of Christ). During this time, children could speak to Fr Andrew and say sorry for anything they had done wrong, knowing God would forgive them.

During Lent, we had a special visitor, Ann from CAFOD, who led an assembly for the whole school on the effects of the climate crisis. We followed the story of Dristy, a young girl in Bangladesh whose life has been greatly affected by the changes in the earth's climate. Every class had a CAFOD workshop where they explored aspects of Catholic Social teaching, looking at how we treat our common home and the people in it with respect.

The Chaplaincy team led the whole school in the Big Lent Walk. During Lent CAFOD set the challenge to walk 200km to help raise money for an important cause. This year the Big Lent walk is to help all people affected by the Climate Crisis. Whilst walking, we reflected and prayed for people who have to walk long distances every day to get clean water, food, or medicine.









Year 1 have been very busy this month. In Science, we have continued our learning with exploring Humans and Animals. We have been looking into the 6 different animal groups and the facts that relate to each group. We had the exciting visit to see some of the animals from those groups and we were able to hold and stroke them whilst discussing the key information that we had learnt. In Art we have been exploring David Hockney and through this we have been learning about primary and secondary colours and exploring what makes a warm and cold colour. We have gone on to look at different equipment we can use alongside different techniques. We will use the skills we have learnt to go on to create our own inspired piece of Art. In RE, we have been looking at changes and some of the Key Events that happened during Lent. The children alongside their writing have been using their acting skills. Recently we made our own palms and wrote messages to Jesus on them and then use-them in re-creating the Palm Sunday story.























Year 2 have been learning all about the fishing heritage of Grimsby in their history topic. They launched the topic with a trip to the local fishing heritage centre and discovered what life was like for a fisherman in the 1950s when Grimsby was the largest fishing port of the world. They were given jobs on board and even made their own nets and spliced the ropes.







In Science we have continued with our 'Living things and their habitat' unit and explored why certain animals are more suited to some habitats. We ended this unit with a live lesson meeting different kinds of animals and the children were able to demonstrate what they have learnt by answering the questions on what type of eaters they are and where they live.













In Design and Technology <u>Year 3</u> have been learning all about cams and planning their own automaton. They tested how different shaped cams changed the movement of the follower and used this information to pick which shape they would like in their own automaton.









In History, our topic has been Medieval and Tudor Grimsby. We had the opportunity to visit the town hall and meet Grimsby's mayor, asking many questions. Children even got to sit in the council chambers! We also learned how to plague came to Grimsby and the impact it had on our locality.






In Science, we have been learning about forces and magnets. We have had a big focus on friction which is the force between two moving surfaces. We have tested pushing a car on different surfaces and seeing how far they go; we have also used force meters to measure how many newtons are needed to move an object and then tested how moving a shoe along

different surfaces affect how many are needed to pull it.



In Year 4, children have just started studying decimals. We have learned that 0.1 is equivalent to 1 tenth. In Literacy - we focused on writing an information text where children created their own mythical creature and wrote an information text. After this unit we learned about persuasive writing; looking at a persuasive leaflet advert for a theme park and enabling the children to learn how to use persuasive language. In Science, children have learned about classification of animals can be sorted: mammals, birds, fish, amphibians and reptiles. We have also learned about vascular and non-vascular plants. In RE, we have learned about giving and receiving, the communion rite and how Christians can live in communion in their daily lives and what set of rules they can live by. Finally, in Art we have been learning about Lee Panizza, who is an Australian abstract artist. Children have experimented with tones, tints and shades and how to mix white, grey and black with primary and secondary colours to create contrasts. We have been using shape to create their own pieces of art work.














In Year 5 Maths, we have been hard at work converting fractions. The children have also learned about the value of fractions and the role of a numerator and a denominator. We learned how to convert improper fractions to mixed numbers and vice versa. The children have learned how to add and take away fractions. Also in Year 5, we have learnt how to make tomato soup from fresh ingredients as well as how to dice, peel and grate.
