Attendance

Thank you all for continuing to make our school's attendance higher than the national average. We would like to improve the number of lates we are having.

The school gates close at 8:55am and ideally, we would like your child to be here before this time so they can enter the school from the playground and have time to put their coats, pack lunches etc. away and be in class for when the register is taken at 9:00am.

If your child arrives after 8:55am we are now asking you to sign them in, even though they are not late. The reason for this is that if they take time getting to the classroom and the register is taken at 9 they will be initially marked as absent, some mornings the children have assemblies to go to and these take place as soon as the register is taken so the class teacher will not have time to change the register and office staff need a record that your child is in school.

If you are having problems getting your child to school for 8:55am then please let us know and we will do what we can to help.

Wolds Wildlife Park






Our first school trip has been to Wolds Wildlife Park. We had a fantastic day starting our journey on the coach, which the children found very exciting. We saw many animals and learned about where they live and what they eat in the wild. The children have used this experience to have class discussions, create artwork and start to write sentences.







During March we all enjoyed book day. Dressing up as our favourite characters or coming to school in our pyjamas was such fun. We even had a visit from the Mighty Mariner!













In RE lessons, we have been working on our topic, Change. We began this topic by thinking about the ways we have changed since we started school.

We then went on to discuss how Lent is a time to change and make a new start. We all wrote a Lenten promise which we made to keep throughout Lent.

We also acted out the events of Holy Week, from Palm Sunday, which begins Holy Week, through to Good Friday and the resurrection of Jesus. This has helped us understand these events in Scripture.

We also enjoyed celebrating Mass with the Parish.
















In History we have been learning about the history of Cleethorpes. We have learnt how the railway was built to attract people to the town and all about the fire on the Pier. We have learnt a lot about the changes in Cleethorpes over time.

Acting out the fire under the pavilion




In Maths we have been working on tens and ones and numbers to 50. We have now moved onto measuring in standard and nonstandard units.



Year 2 kicked off their history topic, The Fishing Heritage of Grimsby, with a trip to the Fishing Heritage Centre.
Children explored artefacts from the 1950s when Grimsby was the largest fishing port in the world. They learnt what life was like both at sea as a fisherman and for the families left back at home.



In Science children have been learning the importance of exercise and a balanced diet in order for us to have healthy strong bodies. Children performed experiments to test the effects of exercise on our hearts.







In RE our topic is Opportunities and the children have learnt ways in which Lent is a good time when we have opportunities to do good. This can be to take on something extra during this time to help others or to give something up to be like Jesus who fasted for forty days and forty nights. Children also role played what happens on Ash Wednesday that marks the start of Lent.









Year 3 have had a really good term settling in without new teacher Miss Bates, whilst Miss Baker has her baby! For our Reading skills we began by looking at similarities and differences between turtles and tortoises. We then moved onto Japanese legends; For The Story of Momotaro and finishing of one of our favourite books "An Alien in the Jam Factory", using our VIPERs skills. In writing we have been focusing on instruction writing and have even written our own instructions for 'how to heal a broken heart' including our time conjunctions, imperative verbs and adjectives.

We have enjoyed learning all about our Local History and how key events such as the plague affected Grimsby and we are looking forward to our trip to Grimsby Town Hall to meet the Mayor. We have come up with lots of questions we want to ask him.

In Science we have been learning all about nutrition and The Eatwell plate and discussing the importance of a balanced diet. We know all the animal groups and their diets and habitats. We have enjoyed learning all about simulations in Computing and have learnt how we can use these safely and the advantages of them. We have come up with an amazing idea for our Class charity of 'guess how many jelly beans in the jar' and have written a beautiful letter to our charity 'Make Them Smile.' We have finished off our maths topic of fractions and have moved onto mass and kilograms.





Year 4, in Biology, have been grouping & classifying and learning that living things can be put into different classification groups.
