If you missed it or couldn't make it to the performance, there will be a further performance of Resurrection Rock on the last Friday of this half term. We will keep you


all posted.

Next week, during our RE lessons the children will be learning all about how a new Pope is elected what a conclave is, where it is held and also opportunities to reflect on the Life of Pope






In our RE lessons this term all year groups have been learning about the story of the Resurrection and Ascension day and as we move forward we will be celebrating the feast of Pentecost.

#### Year 1

This term began full of excitement as we headed off on our trip to The Deep in Hull. This visit was linked to our learning in Geography in which we are learning about the Arctic and Antarctica (Polar Regions) where children will conduct a comparative study between Grimsby and these polar regions.



We had a great day, the children were a credit to our school. We enjoyed a tour of the deep, watching the penguins and seeing lots of underwater creatures.

Our workshop focussed on the polar regions in which we undertook lots of practical activities and listened to a presentation.













#### Learning in Year 2

In our first geography lesson for our new topic 'Kenya', children have learnt some key geographical facts about the country. They located which continent it is found and the location within that continent. They also used iPads to research more facts about the African country.







In our RE Explore lesson for our new topic 'Spread the Word', children learnt the importance and responsibility of passing on messages. To understand this we played a game of Chinese whispers to show how important clear communication is but also good listening so messages are relayed perfectly. This led us to listen to the scripture of when the two Mary's heard the Good News from the angels about Jesus had risen. They then had the responsibility to spread the word of God.










In our writing lessons children have been learning contractions which is a word that is formed by joining two words together. An apostrophe is used to replace the letters removed.











Year 4 visited The Deep in Hull as part of our new Geography topic, 'Australia – The Great Barrier Reef. We came to look at the different kinds of wildlife that live in a coral habitat and the elements that help them survive and thrive.





We were even lucky enough to see the sharks being fed by some very brave divers and look at their special suits.





We learnt about the dangers and threats to coral and how we can be proactive and help to care for the Reef in a special workshop called 'Life on the Reef'. This will help the children greatly with their learning throughout this topic.







Last term Y3 went on an enriching trip to Grimsby Town Hall, offering the opportunity to delve into the Town's History. We explored Grimsby's 'Time Trap Museum' filled with old objects and pictures of important people from Grimsby's past. A guide showed us around and explained the history of the Town Hall, what happens here and found out how decisions are made for the town. The children thoroughly enjoyed visiting the council chamber where the town leaders meet to talk about important things related to the town. We asked the Mayor lots of questions about his work such as; how he helps the people of Grimsby, what he does for them and if his work ever takes him to interesting countries. We had a very fun and interesting day, which helped us understand more about our town and made us feel proud to live here.

## **Important Information for Year 6 SATs**

The Year 6 children are working incredibly hard in preparation for their **Standard Assessment Tests (SATs),** which are an essential milestone in a child's educational journey. These exams, administered in primary schools, play a key role in assessing the progress of students in core subjects, Reading, English and Mathematics. SATs help both teachers and parents gauge a child's academic development and readiness for the next stage of their education in secondary school.

Week commencing Monday 12<sup>th</sup> May, the children will be invited in for breakfast at 8am each morning (supplied by the school) so that they can talk through any worries or concerns before the test papers are administered.

The tests are delivered each day in this order:

Monday 9:15am Spelling, punctuation and grammar

**Tuesday 9:15am Reading** 

Wednesday 9:15am Maths Paper 1 Arithmetic followed by Paper 2 Reasoning

#### Thursday 9:15am Maths Paper 3 Reasoning

It is compulsory that all children are in on all of these days, as it is a legal requirement. Any problems will need to be consulted with Mr O'Connor, as alternative arrangements would need to be made.


We wish all the children in Year 6, the very best of luck!

In reading we have been practising all


of our skills in preparation for SATs'
